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THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

MOTT's AGM was held on August 28th at the home of Patrick Peek Esq., in Alderley. There being no minutes of the 2009 AGM held at Fran Gilje's, there was, of course, no business arising out of them.

The Treasurer's Report was presented by Jan Mealy and showed a decline in membership fees; a drastic decline in donations and other income; a decline in interest, so that income would have been well down on last year but for the Grant received from the Gambling Community Benefit Fund.

Expenditure, on the other hand was well up, triple that of 2009, so that we ended the year with total assets of \$61,329.68 which includes \$30,108.68 in the bank.

There was no audit to the report as our assets are below the threshold where one is necessary.

A motion was moved and passed to increase membership fees. The cost of membership will now increase to \$25 per person; \$45 for a family membership; active planters' subscription will stay at \$10.

President Jeff Mustard presented his report (see July newsletter) but added a report on MOTT's presentation to Macquarie Bank.

Jeff welcomed Sarah O'Brien and Lisa Glyde to MOTT; they will work together as MOTT's first PR team. Alyce Cowan has since joined the team.

In the discussion to add *Bringing Back the Forests* to the MOTT Logo it was revealed that Queensland is the world's second biggest state destroyer of forests after Brazil. The addition to the logo was approved.

The elections for executive positions and committee were held. Jeff Mustard will continue as president; we acknowledge the work



done as treasurer over many years by Jan Mealy and welcome Gareth Johnsen as MOTT's new treasurer. Kerry Walker will continue to act as secretary until somebody is prepared to relieve her of the position. Sarah O'Brien and Lisa Glyde have joined the general committee.

Patrick Peek moved a vote of thanks to acknowledge the students who have been coming to plantings. He also moved a vote of thanks to the group itself from which, he said, he has had many pleasant hours.

Marion Goward moved a vote of thanks to Scott Maxwell for all the graphic design and photographic work that he has undertaken for MOTT.



“Every morning when we get out of bed, we look around and we see something beautiful”, said Gerry Dunford. “I appreciate beauty, and that includes the environment, which is all around us. We don’t need to go to a gallery to look at a picture”.



Gerry came to MOTT in 1992 when he took an early retirement from the Commonwealth Bank. He was the lucky recipient of a ‘Golden Handshake’ back when computers were first beginning to take over people’s jobs and before companies realized that they usually made such a mess of things that more staff than ever were needed to clean up after them. Still young enough to begin a new career, Gerry chose to retire and just enjoy life, hopefully doing something to make the world a better place.

DAVID ARBOR

David Arbor, who has been planting with us for some time, is a finalist in the 2010 Regional Queensland Leader of the Year. His citation reads:

Mr David Arbor, Smart Services Queensland. David has been involved in promoting Queensland and the Queensland Government in many forms during the past three decades. David has been involved in the Queensland Government Agent Program (QGAP), providing a link for regional and rural communities to access the Queensland Government.

David has been instrumental in developing and growing this program from 13 sites to the 78 sites currently operating. David played an integral role in an alliance being established between the Queensland Government and the Credit Union Industry, known as Creditcare to combine government and financial services in rural and remote locations in an initiative designed to return basic banking services to rural towns.

David has implemented quality and audit processes, including operational manuals and financial management manuals. David was also integral to the opening of a QGAP office at Yarrabah, a small aboriginal community south east of Cairns.

Under David's expert guidance, the first integrated Queensland Government Service Counter successfully opened its doors on 5 October 2009. Additional counters will be opening in Maroochydore and Cairns in 2010 and 2011.

Relationships are an integral part of David's role. To this end, David created the QGAP Managers' forum. David is passionate about community initiatives, not only at work, but also in his personal involvement in the scouting movement and Men of the Trees, a non-profit, non-political international society dedicated to fostering the planting, maintenance and protection of trees.

MR. KISHIMOTO

I was six years old in 1940 - World War II was raging in Europe and the Japanese empire was completing the planned subjugations of its "Greater East Asia Co-prosperity Sphere", but none of this had yet affected the tranquility of my back yard on Chevy Chase Drive in Beverly Hills.

My father had enrolled my sister and me in something called the "Men of the Trees" that beside encouraging me to plant seeds and trees, entitled me to wear a tiny badge with a depiction of an evergreen tree on it. This led to an added benefit – in my imagination I could become a forest ranger, roaming among the trees and plants that comprised our backyard eco-system on imaginary woodland adventures.

A wonderful old man named Jimu "Jimmy" Kishimoto was engaged as our gardener and landscaper. Jimmy arrived twice a week at 7 AM, in his battered 1920's vintage Ford pickup truck - the tools of his trade - push lawnmower, edger, shovels, spades, seedlings in small cardboard boxes and seeds in linen pouches, were organized carefully in the truck's wooden bed.

Jimmy radiated an aroma of dirt and vegetation - an intoxicating smell to a six year old "forest ranger" – he was always clad in worn jodhpur breeches stuffed into "gum" boots, a work-soiled khaki long-sleeved shirt and a worn leather vest, topped-off with a battered, sweat-stained fedora hat, and of course the ubiquitous laborer's bandanna around his neck.

His language was strange - his "r's" always sounded more like "l's" to me - and vice-versa - I was fascinated by him, and dogged his footsteps, relishing each encounter with this "foreigner" from far-off Japan.

For his part, Jimmy was extremely patient with me -- he was meticulous in his work, but I always felt that he welcomed the opportunity to pass-on bits and pieces of his vast botanical knowledge to his little tow-headed "assistant." Jimmy communicated his consuming love for

trees, plants, garden animals and all growing things by showing me how to plant, trim and graft new limbs on the trees in our backyard – I watched fascinated as he planted a lemon tree in an area he had carefully cultivated next to the swimming pool (which became our "Victory Garden" during World War II) and a pomegranate tree and some poinsettias next to my sister's playhouse.

He instructed me carefully on the mysterious manner in which bees pollinated the avocado tree dad had gotten as a gift from gossip columnist Louella Parsons, showing me how their busy endeavors caused the reluctant tree to finally bear fruit.

The present owner of our former Beverly Hills home recently inform me that after seventy-odd years the trees that I "helped" Jimmy plant still flourish and bear fruit, and the poinsettias still flower around Christmastime - a tribute to Jimmy's botanical wizardry and his incredibly adept "green thumb."

I followed him around faithfully for two years - and then suddenly it was December 7th 1941 - we listened to FDR's famous "Day of Infamy" Pearl Harbor speech on the Philco console radio in dad's study – soon after that Jimmy disappeared - dad later discovered that, like so many Japanese-Americans, he and his family had been taken from their home and interned in a camp in northern California for the duration of the war – I vaguely recall dad attempting to intercede on his behalf to no avail - sadly, I never saw Jimmy again.

These days I write natural and cultural history booklets, stories and essays about the rainforest eco-systems that begin quite near my backyard in northeastern Puerto Rico - I like to think that if I have developed any skill in describing vegetation and wildlife, it was nurtured by Jimmy Kishimoto -- his patience with a bothersome little botanical acolyte jump-started my lifelong interest in our planet's flora and fauna.
